Project Based Learning Deepens Instruction, Addresses Common Core Standards

We now know that the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) look very different than our recently replaced state standards. Our current task is to determine how to best teach the new standards in a way that "focuses on depth rather than coverage, thinking rather than memorizing or listing, and demonstrating and performing rather than 'hand it in and grade it'" (Markham, 2012). Underscoring the standards is the importance of creating assignments that require students to write routinely over extended time frames for a range of real

tasks, for real audiences and with real purpose (p.41). To successfully implement the new standards, while meeting the needs of our 21st century learners, teachers will need to embrace "innovative best practices that persuade and prepare students to engage in thoughtful problem solving, as well as encourage better performance through more sophisticated, broad-based assessments" (Markham, 2012). This can be accomplished through project-based learning (PBL). Markham (2012) identifies six important parts of PBL, which facilitate the instructional shifts required to meet the CCSS goals - moving from instruction to inquiry; balancing knowledge and skills; going deep; teaching teamwork;

establishing a culture of inquiry; and blending coaching with teaching. To read Markham's full text of Project-Based Learning and Common Core continued on page 2



Prerequisites of Effective Professional Learning

of effective professional learning.
The new seven
standards focus
on educator learning that relates to
student learning.
These fundamental

prerequisites are not identified or described in the standards list themselves but "reside where professional learning intersects with professional ethics" as stated in the Quick Reference Guide created by Learning Forward.

Prerequisite 1: Educators' commitment to students, all students, is the foundation of effective professional learning.

Educators must engage in continuous improvement to know enough and be skilled enough to meet the learning needs of all students.

Prerequisite 2: Each educator involved in professional learning comes to

Professional learning is a partnership among professionals who engage with one another to access or construct knowledge, skills, practice, and dispositions

> Prerequisite 3: Because there are disparate experience levels and use of practice among educators, professional learning can foster collaborative inquiry and learning that enhances individual and collective performance. Professional accountability for individual and peer results strengthens the profession and results for students.

> > Prerequisite 4: Like all learners, educators learn in different

ways and at different levels. Professional learning must engage each educator in timely, high-quality learning that meets his or her particular learning needs.

Brown To Share Strategies To Help Schools 'Ascend To Greater Heights' With Common Core

"Ascend to Greater Heights" will be the focus when Learning Forward Kansas holds its annual Leadership Conference April 23-24, 2013 at the Wichita Doubletree Airport in Wichita, KS. The conference features Frederick Brown, director of strategy and development for Learning Forward, as the keynote speaker. Brown will address the topic, "Creating the Conditions for Common Core Implementation – Lessons from Kentucky," answering through experience the question, "How do we create systems at the state and district levels that support the implementation of these new standards?"

Prior to his appointment at Learning Forward, Brown was a senior program officer at The Wallace Foundation, based in New York City. There he guided the work of several major grantees including the Atlanta-based Southern Regional Education Board and the Institute for Learning at the University of Pittsburgh. Brown also managed Wallace's role as a strategic partner for leadership initiatives in the states of Ohio, Iowa, Wisconsin, Oregon, Kansas, and New Jersey. Finally, he supported the development of The Principal Story, the film documentary that followed the journey of two elementary principals throughout a school year as they strived to improve student achievement and implement school reform.

In addition to his keynote presentation, Brown will offer two breakout sessions during the conference focusing on "Going Deep with the Standards" and "Becoming a Learning System."

Breakout sessions emphasizing the areas of common core implementation, leadership, instruction, mentoring, and best practices will also be offered by Kansas educators as a part of the conference. Examples of planned sessions include: addressing academic vocabulary, iPad and the Common Core, opening the door to coaching conversations, and promoting self-questioning through picture book illustrations.

Professional Development Helps Build Foundation For Success

Top two reasons for new educators to get involved in professional development:

1. Contrary to belief, sometimes professional support is irregular and inadequate. In many districts the staff tries to regularly collaborate and help each other. However, due to time restraints and poor training this is not always meaningful. A lot of new teachers end up placed with highly challenging classes without appropriate support and guidance. With proper meaningful professional development, a new educator is then provided the resources and guidance to be successful.

2. The teacher is one of the most important factors influencing students and their achievement. Metaphorically speaking, a teacher is the foundation or solid base guiding students to build knowledge and become successful life-long learners. If there are gaps or cracks in the teacher's "foundation"- eventually the building will begin to lean or teeter. When a new educator enters the teaching world, there must be an understanding that in order to be a successful teacher one must be provided meaningful professional development and have a willingness to continue developing as an educator every day in order to build a strong "foundation."
